Also please take a moment before any walk to check the temperature of the ground as this can be very hot on the dogs paws. You can test it with your hands, if it is too hot then your dog's feet are going to burn.

At the grounds there will be wading pools for the dogs to cool down in. If you notice excessive panting and your dog is hot to touch please inform your instructor and take a break under a tree and if needed wet your dog down. Breeds with pushed in faces should be monitored closely as they are extremely susceptible to heat stroke.

Finally have fun and enjoy the term and remember if you have any questions, please speak to any one of the friendly members in RED shirts.

Members doing specific exercises during classes are exempt



SCOOP THE POOP



You are required to clean up after your dog if it defecates on Club grounds

You can be prepared, wherever you go, by arming yourself with a small plastic bag or two. Simply put your hand inside the bag, scoop up the offending pile, reverse your hand out of the bag and tie the neck of the bag. Then dispose of thoughtfully.

The Art of Engagement

In October 2018, the club supported four instructors Karen Jenkins, Kathy Griffith, Carmen Kong and Jodie Moore, participated in a training workshop "The Art of Engagement", to learn more about ways to keep our dogs engaged during training and in trials. The workshop was taught by Sharonika Williamson of Clear Canine and Tammy Peters from Precise K9. Here are some insights our instructors want to share, and they will continue to incorporate their knowledge in classes.

Training is about a lifelong relationship.

Develop a clear communication system. Marker training is about developing reliable communication. The six main types of markers are:

- 1. Reward for indicating correct behaviour, reward (e.g. food) is coming
- Non-reward to indicate incorrect behaviour, dog should try again
 Duration to indicate correct behaviour which should be continued
- 4. Start cue opens the window of opportunity for the dog to earn rewards
- 5. Finish cue closes the window of opportunity for reward, ends the training session
- 6. Neutral release to free dog from position with no reward because the value is for the position.



for me and trust that I have something good for him.

When the dog is struggling to focus, be patient and don't try to help the dog to focus. Wait for the dog to engage, for example, the dog looks at you. Then reward that engagement. To start with, that might take some time, but son they learn they will be rewarded for engaging.

Keep training short, make it worthwhile, and keep it rewarding.

Keep reinforcement rates high. Rewards should have value for the dog – it is what the dog likes.

Dog should be able to work

Movement is reinforcing. Reward is not only delivery of food or toys, but can be done with movement, for example, throw the reward or run backwards and let the dog chase the reward.

Pre-cues can help dogs prepare for the behaviour and give dogs warning before the actual exercise. These can be visual or verbal, for example, turn head a little prior to a turn with feet.
