President's Report

Hello every-one and welcome to the Queanbeyan and District Dog Training Club. I hope you enjoy coming out to the club as much as I do.

I hope every-one enjoyed Christmas and the New Year's celebrations.

Now it is time to start training your dog. Just a tip...training is not just about the lessons at the club; it is about all the moments you have with your dog. Sitting with them, taking them for a walk, playing fetch; keep them interested and focused. Any learning is increased when you are having fun.

This summer has been hot and dry and unfortunately our grounds have suffered greatly. We acknowledge there are multiple burr patches and that your dogs will pick up these burrs very easily. Please take the time and brush your dog after training to prevent any irritations. Having a small Shih- Tzu cross myself, I understand this will be a time-consuming. Allow some extra time and don't rush; try and think of it as a way to get to know your dog. Find a brush that suits your dog's coat and start gently brushing the burrs out of their coat (don't forget under their paws as well). If you make it a fun bonding session, both you and the dog will enjoy it more.

On the grounds, the committee is looking into ways to combat the burrs and have lined up a subcommittee to help with this. This way we can start introducing some strategies to combat the pesky burrs. 

Rally O




Rally O classes are now being held Sundays, each Term at **9 - 10am**, 2nd week of each term.

Any of our members who have passed **Intermediate** level may join in. Try it for the first week free, then complete the <u>Rally O online membership form</u> and you will be asked to deposit the Rally O training fee of \$30.

Rally O is a fun dog sport where you and your dog work together as a team performing various exercises in a more informal and light-hearted manner other than traditional obedience.

Unlike traditional obedience, waiting for your instructor to give you commands, you proceed around a course of designated stations with your dog in heel position. The course consists of 10 to 20 signs that instruct you and your dog what to do.



You are required to clean up after your dog if it defecates on Club grounds

You can be prepared, wherever you go, by arming yourself with a small plastic bag or two. Simply put your hand inside the bag, scoop up the offending pile, reverse your hand out of the bag and tie the neck of the bag. Then dispose of thoughtfully.

Meet the Instructor: Jan Loose

Jan is the Secretary of the club. On Sunday mornings, she can be found training in CCD.



How long have you been training your dog(s)?

The first dog I trained was a very independent Bearded Collie back in 1988 at Berwick Obedience Dog Club in Victoria. Following that I trained a mini Schnauzer cross (Moorabbin obedience & agility, Berwick flyball) and Jack Russell cross (Moorabbin obedience).

My current dog Sherlock (cattle dog cross) began his training at Moorabbin Obedience Dog Club (Victoria) before we relocated to NSW/ACT in 2015. I joined Queanbeyan club and still enjoy bringing him to CCD classes when I can fit it in. As well as obedience, we have had a go at Recreation classes and Rally-O at this club, and Introduction to Noseworks (at Canberra Noseworks Training).

What do you like most about training your dog(s)?

Training different breeds with different personalities means there is always something new to learn and keep each dog stimulated, challenged and happy. They have all found a way to surprise me.

What has been the best bit of advice you've received about dog training and why?

Mainly to be confident and have fun while training. The important thing is to be consistent both in class and at home and in the timing of rewards.



Why did you decide to be an instructor?

After moving interstate, I was looking for new challenges. Since being asked to become an instructor, I have enjoyed the opportunity to pass on my knowledge to other handlers and watch them succeed in their training goals. I have found it has improved my relationship with my own dog and my skills as a handler.



What is your biggest challenge as an instructor?

Working with a full class and assessing how to teach handlers and dogs all with different learning capabilities. When we can solve a problem or achieve a goal, it is really satisfying.

How do you spend your time with your dog when it's not Sunday morning?

When my children were younger and living at home we always had two dogs at a time and life was busy. Visiting a holiday house and walking along the beach was a favourite pastime in Victoria. Now back to one dog I am looking forward to more road trips and

holidays where he can come too. Sherlock also loves exploring, chasing the ball on our 3-acre block and supervising our landscaping projects.
