## YOUR FIRST OBEDIENCE \& RALLY TRIAL

So, you want to enter your first Obedience or Rally trial

When you have reached training at our Companion or Graduate levels you may decide to set you and your do another challenge and have a go at official trials.

Once you decide this it is important to do some homework and preparation to set yourselves up for success.

Things you can do are

- Ask questions - talk to your instructor and club members who trial
- Get hold of a Dogs Australia rule book from our club shop and find out what is expected of you and your dog at the level you are trialling
- Make sure you and your dog are members of your state dog control, Dogs NSW if you live in NSW, or Dogs ACT if you live in Canberra
- Find out where local trials are advertised and how to enter
- Ask you instructor to run you through some mock trials
- Visit some trials to see what happens. Clubs are always looking for stewards to help judges in the ring, so volunteer - you'll learn heaps being in the ring with the judge and judges will be happy to answer questions after the judging finishes

Trialling can be loads of fun and it's a great day out for you and your dog. It gives your dog more brain work to make them a happier more fulfilled. And if you come home with a qualifying certificate or a sash, even better!

Going to your first trial having done this preparation will make you feel more confident - sure, you'll have butterflies on the day, even the most experienced triallers do! Just go out and have fun with your dog and whether you win or lose, leave the ring as though you've come $1^{\text {st }}$ and know you and your best mate have had a good crack at it!

Our trial coming up on 13 July is a great place to come to have a look at what happens, or to help steward if you have some time. We have the obedience trial in the morning and the rally trial in the afternoon.

## VOLUNTEER TO BE A OBEDIENCE INSTRUCTOR

Did you know that your club is always on the lookout for enthusiastic members who may like to become one of our club's obedience instructors?

To become an instructor at the club, you must have passed Advanced Class. You also need to undertake the Level 1 Instructors Course, held by our amazing head instructor, Ann, at the club.

You will then shadow a current instructor for a term or two until you feel confident that you can instruct a class on your own.

## CLUB PERPETUAL AWARDS

Queanbeyan and District Dog Training Club hands out Perpetual Awards to its members at the end of each training year. The club's awards encourage and acknowledge effort and excellence in club activities and ANKC sanctioned activities that reflect well upon the club and club members.

Evaluation for awards is on performances over at least three of the four terms in the evaluation period, with each evaluation period commencing with Term 4 of the year preceding the award year, and Terms 1, 2, and 3 of the award year. This allows time for the committee to finalise decisions on awards and prepare trophies for presentation at the end of Term 4.

Instructors nominate members for the Annual Awards on performance categories as follows, which is presented to the Committee for discussion and final nomination:

## Best Gentleman Handler and Best Lady Handler

Presented to a gentleman handler and a lady handler who during the year have:

- shown outstanding handling skills in training;
- regularly attended training at the club during the year; and
- not received a title award from the club during the year.


## Best Junior Handler

Presented to a junior handler (under 16) who has regularly attended classes and has made significant progress in training their dog during the year.

## Most Improved

Presented to the handler and dog team that has shown significant improvement (which may be evidenced by assessment scores throughout the year) in training during the year through the dedication and commitment of the handler. The interaction and relationship between the dog and handler is an important consideration.

## Encouragement Award

Presented to the handler and dog team that has overcome difficulties (whether personal or dog related), and shown dedication and commitment to training and has made commendable progress during the year.

## BLOOD HOUNDS

Did you know that pets can donate blood just like humans. In fact, it is not a well known fact and many pets lives are put at risk because of the need for blood. Recently Rhonda Daley received a call from the Animal Referral Hospital (ARH) at Majura Park looking for pets who could donate blood urgently for patients in need. We were referred by a friend and we answered the call.

This is a photo of Rhonda Daley's boy when we got home.

Detailed below are the requirements that your pet needs to meet to become a donor. Please, please think seriously about this. Who knows one day it may be your pet needing the gift of blood.

If your pet fits the below criteria, give the ARH a call on 62806344 and ask for Olivia. Tell her you are from the Queanbeyan Dog Club and she will be very happy to help you. Oh, cats can also donate, just in case your interested.


Your dog must be:

- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ to 7 years old
- over 25 kg
- in good health
- no pre-existing health problems
- good temperament (not aggressive to people ideally)
- Up to date with vaccines, worming, flea etc


## Process:

1. Blood type dog first (either Negative or Positive). Use both but type Negative is used more as it is universal.
2. Dog will get a full health exam (focusing on the heart) and a full blood work up - free of charge.
3. Place an intravenous catheter and given appropriate sedation, only enough to make them sleepy so they stay still during the procedure. Can reverse most sedatives to it's relatively safe.
4. Will clip the fur from the right side of their neck (a hand sized clip) as this is a sterile procedure.
5. Collect 450 mls of blood from the jugular vein.
6. After the collection, give dog intravenous fluids to replace the blood loss.
7. Once fully recovered (usually about 2 hrs post) can go home.
8. Aftercare: Go home with bandage on neck to hold pressure onto the jugular vein, this will need to stay on for another couple of hours. Once removed, ask to monitor for any bleeding, swelling, excessive bruising or any ill signs.
9. Gifts to say thank you: Receive a bag of treats, a full size bag of dog food, $\$ 113$ credit on your account and a cute pic with shoutout on Facebook page (with owner consent).

# Understanding your Dog's Body Language Tail Position 

Learning your dog's body language can better help you understand their behaviour, when they are happy or anxious, and how to better care for them. This article is about the dog's tail position.
A lot of people think if a dog's tail is wagging, they are happy, but it's not necessarily so. It is just an indicator of the dog's arousal level (or level of alertness).
First find out what the natural tail carriage is for the dog. The sign of a friendly tail wag is a relaxed slow wag with the rest of the body soft as well (think of a wiggy Labrador).

It the tail is positioned very high (if it can be), and wagging very fast like a flag, the rest of the body still, and the dog is staring intently at something, this could mean the dog is quite concerned and it is best to stay away.
Remember that some breeds can naturally carry their tails high (like Huskies) and others have natural low tail carriages (like sighthounds).

Natural tail carriage, tail may be wagging gently = Relaxed
Tail is loose and wiggly; it may also wag in a circular fashion (helicopter tail) = Happy
Tail held high and stiff with a rigid wag = Arousal/excited (an enhanced state of alertness)

## Tail between the legs = Fearful/anxious

For dogs with no tail or a tight curled short tail like a bulldog, while the tail can't go between the legs or be held high, the tail is an extension of the spine so look at the while body. The movement of the tail can be very subtle.
It's important to read the dog's while body and not just one part, plus take into consideration the context in which the behaviour is happening.
